The Gypsy Wagon delivers gifts from a world of communities

Gypsies are known as travelers who set up shop in different places and sell their wares.

“That’s kind of what I wanted the community to have is somewhere they could bring their trades or their talents,” says Andrea Gould, owner of The Gypsy Wagon in Glenholme.

Unlike traditional gypsies, however, Andrea wants to stay and help craftspeople locally and from around the world sell their unique creations. She does this by offering space to more than 60 local craftspeople and artists to sell their goods on consignment.

Plus, she offers Fair Trade products, inspired by their motto: *A product is not just a thing for sale, it’s art with a human touch deep inside.*

Most of the crafts are handmade and many come with a story, from women in Peru or Guatemala supporting their families to the disabled in India or Uganda trying to make ends meet.

The local stories are often about people having the opportunity to show their skills and talents and earn some money at the same time.

“You can’t find a lot of the stuff in here anywhere else,” says Andrea, who opened her shop in April 2010. She tries to offer unique gifts at reasonable prices.

“There’s a lot of pride in the product and that pride comes from the community that’s here or from a distant community we can bring ourselves to relate to.”
